Parish Accommodations & Accessibility Checklist

Welcoming and accompanying children and adults with disabilities

People at my parish are encouraged to ask for what they need in order to have meaningful participation at Mass and in parish life through or by:

- My pastor at Mass
- Ongoing bulletin announcements
- Parish Website Home Page
- Parish Registration Process: on-line, hard copy, in person, and over the phone
- Parish Survey

My parish offers and promotes the following accommodations at Mass:

- Sensory Friendly Mass
- LOOP (Assisted Listening System)
- ASL Interpreter (American Sign Language)
- Braille materials
- Large-print missals/large print worship aids
- Low-gluten hosts or communion from the chalice
- Cut-out pews that allow wheelchair user to sit in pew with others
- Trained greeters, ushers, staff, and volunteers to assist if needed
- Children and adults with disabilities are trained and serve in ministerial roles and can be assisted by family/staff if desired

My parish is intentional about providing sacramental prep for children and adults with disabilities and promotes this through:

- Expressed often by my pastor at Mass
- Conveyed by staff (parish & school)
- Ongoing bulletin announcements
- School newsletter
- Parish Faith Formation Webpage

My parish is accessible for individuals using wheelchairs and other mobility devices by following the ADA guidelines:

- Level access to entrances of every parish building and/or
- Ramp: 36 inches wide and incline of one inch for every foot of ramp
- Entrances: 32 inches wide with an automatic door opener for church, restrooms, parish office, parish hall/activity center, and Adoration Chapel
- 60-inch diameter of clear floor space to allow a wheelchair user to make a 360° turn in restroom (including stall), cut-out pew, confessional, and gathering spaces
- Designated accessible parking spaces located by all parish buildings
- Cut-out curbs/ramps near accessible parking spaces
- Clear signage is posted to identify the accommodation provided

My parish publicizes the support services available for individuals experiencing mental health issues:

 Parishioners are informed by the pastor and staff, through bulletin announcements and the parish website that they can contact their pastor regarding mental health issues for themselves or a loved one and he will assist in getting individuals connected to Catholic Charities for help

My parish has a process in place to respond to an individual or family that makes a request for an accommodation:

- Dedicated staff member or volunteer makes initial contact to gather information
- The individual or family meets with the pastor, staff, parishioners, etc. to consider options and work towards a solution
- Diocesan staff can be contacted for guidance, resources, and implementation
